The results were truly outstanding and when our analysis was complete it was clear that the boys had eclipsed practically every national average for grades achieved across the curriculum. Of far greater significance, there was a 100% success rate for our students in moving onto further education a statistic which is not replicated commonly in schools throughout the country. Our Junior Cycle class of 2023 also received their results a few short weeks later, and again, received excellent grades laying down firm foundations for their future success. We enjoyed a nice morning with the boys here in The Abbey before they returned to work experience placements with renewed vigour.

Student Leadership Team

The main role of a student council set out in the Education Act is "to promote the interests of the school and the involvement of students in the affairs of the school, in co-operation with the board of management, parents and teachers". The student leadership team is a representative structure for all the students in the school. It has a very important role in augmenting the voice of the whole student body through the respective class leaders. Each class group has at least one student representative elected. Students develop a range of leadership skills by being active members on the council, which are all transferable and will be of benefit to them during their time at school and as they navigate their way through life after school in third level, the world of work and beyond. Mr. Conor Hayes and Ms. Irene Ryan are the link teachers for the 2023-2024 Student Leadership Team.

The Student Leadership Team sets its own objectives,

and these vary from year to year. Some general objectives could be uniform related, policy review, improved communication between teachers/ management and students. They meet at regular intervals to discuss matters arising in the school. They recently organised a Christmas fundraiser for two charities, The Meningitis Research Foundation and Pieta House which raised €800. They will work on a whole school project which seeks to improve student school experience in the new year. 








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Galtees Trip
